6. In the system of compulsory education, despite the fact that the concept of "two foreign languages" does not indicate which languages to study, in practice, no one doubts that the first foreign language should be English.

In conclusion, new approaches to the educational process are aimed at preparing our students for the increasing needs of international academic mobility, which contributes to the enrichment of life experience and the development of linguistic and cultural competencies of young people. To ensure the mobility of students, it is necessary to have a good command of at least one foreign language.
